BOH Director's Report

September 24, 2018

Administrative/Personnel Updates:

- DHHS Subrecipient Monitoring 2016-2017
 - On September 4th the Department submitted to DHHS – Public Health Emergency Preparedness Coordinator a response the results of the subrecipient monitoring completed by the Nebraska Auditor of Public Accounts.
 - Major outcomes from the audit include;
 - Need to formalize fiscal policies that determine whether costs are necessary, reasonable, allocable, and allowable. Specifically addressed policies regarding the use of the credit cards and/or charge accounts.
 - Need for annual vote on portion of dental insurance covered by the employee and the Department.
 - Need to receive an outline of annual CAM expenditures from the Landlord
 - Need to implement procedures to consistently allocate facilities expenses uniformly across grants.
 - Need to discontinue using direct cost methods for charges such as rent, photocopying, supplies, etc. and also using the indirect cost rate (De Minimis).
 - Inclusion of \$25,000 subaward line item into De Minimis calculation.
 - Need to review procedures to accumulate the cost requested for reimbursement and ensure proper review of the request compared to the supporting documentation.
 - Health Director received notification from DHHS on September 18th that no additional action or information was needed at this time.
- Nebraska DHHS Staffing Update
 - Chief Medical Officer Dr. Tom Williams retired August 3rd
 - CEO Dr. Courtney Phillips leaving October 14th
- Live Well Regional Partnership
 - LHDs presented at the Membership Council in August
 - Change Makers Summit – November 3, 2019
 - 2018 CHNA Data will be released via report card
 - The 3 regional LHD will present 2016 CHIP priorities and outcomes at Summit
- 2 Vacant Positions
 - Part-time Health Educator – open since November 2017
 - Full-time Health Educator – open since September 2018
- WIC Breastfeeding Peer Counselors
 - 5 PCs and 1 lead
 - State WIC office reaffirmed funding at \$82,535 with a subaward contract through DCHD for October 1, 2018 – September 30, 2019.

Grants Awarded:

- National Bioterrorism Hospital Preparedness Program; Public Health Emergency Preparedness Program (PHEP) –DHHS - July 1, 2018 – June 30, 2019 - \$156,887.29
 - Provides funding for 1.655 FTEs and includes .075 FTE of Assistant HD, .03 FTE Office Manager, .95 FTE Public Health Nurse-Disease Surveillance/Investigation and .6 FTE of Emergency Response Coordinator

- Public Health Emergency Preparedness Program – Cities Readiness Initiative (CRI) – DHHS – July 1, 2018 – June 30, 2019 - \$44,475
 - Provides funding for .5675 FTE which includes .1375 of Assistant HD, .03 Office Manager and .4 of Emergency Response Coordinator
- Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) Subaward – DHHS – October 1, 2018 – September 30, 2019 - \$13,000
 - Provides funding for .048 FTE which includes .043 FTE of Assistant HD and .005 FTE of Office Manager

- Health coaching calls were provided to 15 women engaged in modifiable health programs through the Health Hub program.
- Three FOBT kits were distributed to the public.
- 210 educational letters were mailed to patients with blood lead levels under 5 µg/L.
- MCH nurses are developing an educational brochure on perinatal mood and anxiety disorders.
- One MCH nurse attended the Lactation Management preparation course in anticipation of taking the board exam for the IBCLC in the fall.
- The Department partnered with DHHS to provide three Swimming Pool Operator training clinics at Midlands Hospital.
